

#### JUNE PROGRAM — PHIL LAPP — Hollowing with the Trent Bosch Visualizer

Phil has tried just about every hollowing tool on the market and will discuss the pros and cons of each one. However, the main focus of the demo will be on the Trent Bosch Visualizer Hollowing System (<a href="www.trentbosch.com">www.trentbosch.com</a>). This unique system allows you to "see" the cutter inside your hollow form enabling you to produce uniform walls to the exact thickness you want. As a bonus, Phil will show how he adapted it to the McNaughton coring system.

#### Graeme Priddle and Melissa Engler in Portland August 12 & 13, 2016

Northwest Woodturners and Cascade Woodturners Association are jointly sponsoring two all-day events featuring internationally recognized turner Graeme Priddle and Melissa Engler. One day will be an all-day demonstration of how to turn, cut and carve spindle turnings, and how to use woodburning and various carving techniques to create surface textures. They will cover basic turning techniques, tool selection and sharpening, wood selection, texturing, carving, finishing techniques, design and influences, and safety. The other day will be a hands-on class with personal instruction on how to do what they have demonstrated.

Graeme Priddle has over 20 years experience in woodworking, and is best known for his sculptural turnings/carvings reflecting his life and environments in Northland, New Zealand. ## TURNIN' N LEARNIN' — CHAPTER 5 by Mike Porter

Hi once again fellow turners who are learners. A shout out this month to Denvy Larson who sent me a story of a lathe incident to share. Here's his story:

"Hello Mike: Today I parted off the last two rings of the next bowl to glue up...wearing my face shield my under powered thin parting tool snapped with a catch and broke. The blade snapped down and the flimsy ferrule stayed intact but the wood separated. The face shield was apparently not needed except for the chips that flew most everywhere in the process. My most constant practice is to stay out of the "line of fire" while starting and operating the lathe."

After reading this, I got to thinking and recalled that in the last year or so that I've been a NWWT member I have consistently seen our demonstrators think about the "line of fire", or the plane of rotation from the lathe towards themselves or towards onlookers, and take appropriate precautions. For example, at the North Woods Figured Woods Open House in March, Mike Meredith had me assist him tape off the floor on the spectator side of the lathe to warn people not to stand "in the line of fire". That's called "walking the talk" where I come from.

On the AAW web site is access to an e-book titled "Safety for Woodturners Book V1". It's a pdf file ready for downloading. The author did some research by interviewing a number of AAW experienced members, then classifying contributing factors such as wood failure, chuck failure, tool misuse or failure (as in Denvy Larson's story above), and beginner/mentor failure. I reread the article and it is a helpful reminder. Interesting to note that Graeme Priddle, an internationally recognized turner who will be presenting two days of his talents and skills here in Portland in August, was one of those interviewed.

So, I recommend you pull up this article on the AAW site, read it, and think about what you can share to the rest of us. Then that got me to thinking...what if we asked every demonstrator to share a safety story before they start their demo? Now wouldn't that get our attention?

#### MAY PROGRAM — STEVE NEWBERRY — Turning a Ladle

Steve has been turning bowls, boxes, candle holders, vases, hollow forms, etc., for over 20 years, and has found that multi-axis turnings are a challenge that seems to hold his interest the most. Lucky for us, Steve is also a great demonstrator, and true to form, he presented a great demo on how to turn a ladle.



It starts with careful selection of the piece of wood. To ensure strength in the final product, Steve selects a piece that has a main branch with a smaller one growing from it at a reasonable angle. The piths of the main branch and the side branch will be in the centers of the ladle bowl and handle attachment stub, respectively, so their diameters matter.



Excess wood is removed on the bandsaw so that the block of wood can more easily be mounted between centers on the lathe. The first orientation is to turn the stub where the handle will mount. After that is completed, the block is remounted so the bowl can be turned. Determining how to position it is the challenge. It must be mounted so that the handle stub will remain after the bowl is turned, all the while producing a ladle bowl of acceptable size and tilted at a useable angle relative to the handle stub. Even with careful attention to selecting turning center locations, and using a compass to help visualize where surfaces will be, a bit of trial and error repositioning on the



lathe is likely to be needed. The bowl is then hollowed being careful to avoid contact with the handle stub that is spinning around in a blur. Finally, the exterior of the bowl is shaped and the ladle is parted off.






#### OTHER MULTI-AXIS WORK BY STEVE NEWBERRY

Steve also does multi-axis, faceplate turning to create some beautiful work. He brought one finished piece and a prototype of another of this type, and explained the turning process during Show-n-Tell. Essentially, the process is to mount the turning block on a faceplate and turn one surface (let's call this the top surface of the piece) to the desired form. The block is then removed from the faceplate, turned over and remounted with the just-turned surface against the faceplate. Of course, to do this might require some custom made shims and/or hold-downs to fasten it securely to the faceplate. Then, the second surface (bottom surface of the piece) is turned and the work piece is removed from the faceplate. Next, the sides of the piece need to be turned. This requires mounting it on the faceplate first on one of its side and then on the other. To do this difficult task, waste blocks are made that conform reasonably well to the shapes of the completed top and bottom surfaces of the piece. These cradle, or clamp, the piece between them and the piece is secured with hot melt glue. Shims may also be necessary to improve the rigidity of the piece. The waste blocks are connected together via a cross piece, and the assembly is fastened to the faceplate. After the first side surface of the piece is shaped, the assembly is removed from the faceplate and the waste block configuration is modified as necessary so the assembly can be flipped over on the faceplate to turn the second side surface. Certainly a challenging process, but one offering great reward when the piece is finished.


