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SEPTEMBER PROGRAM - TOM HASTING - Natural Edge Projects

JULY SHARPENING CLASS REPORT by Roger Crooks

Our second sharpening class had seven students. It was held July 16 in the new and nicely retrofitted Cottage 5 at the MAC. Mike Meredith gave a history of tool steels and a tutorial and on the advantages and disadvantages of each type. China HSS Steel is something to stay away from, although some tools made in China are made with US or English steel and they are good. If unsure, ask a knowledgably salesperson, but plan on paying a few more dollars and buy a brand name tool. Not only will you enjoy it more and turning in general, a cheap tool can be dangerous. If you have a few cheap tools, use them to practice your sharpening skills – grind them down to a stub. From



tool steels we went on to tool design, including negative rake scrapers and how to turn a normal scraper into a negative rake one. More time was spent on gouges – different styles of flutes and bowl vs. spindle gouges.

Sharpening jigs were covered next, and Mike had about every type of jig known to mankind. We had four grinders with both standard stones and CBN wheels so students could try out both. Since the Wolverine jig is the most commonly used jig, students used it to start sharpening their gouges. We saw all types of tools: some very old Sears tools, many with unknown steel, and some with good steel but needing a lot of work. Mike helped fix sharpening mistakes, turn normal scrapers to negative rake, and reminded everyone to grind back the heels of their gouges to avoid burn marks on the wood. I think everyone left with their tools sharp and with the knowledge to keep them that way. A DVD of the tutorial section was included in the class fees – contact me if you have not received yours yet.

AUGUST CHALLENGE & SHOW-n-TELL — NONE, AUCTION INSTEAD

GRAEME PRIDDLE AND MELISSA ENGLER AUGUST CLASS & DEMO REPORT by Jim Schoeffel

I attended Graeme and Melissa's all-day demo on Saturday, August 13th. It was outstanding, and I came away inspired to venture out of my "woodturning is to produce round or cylindrical things" mindset and into one of "turned wood can be the canvas for, or an element in, a work of art".





The demo was centered on making a sprouting seed pod like the ones shown above right. Graeme turned the tapered pod, added coves along its length and then split it along its axis

on the bandsaw. Next, he drew a line around the perimeter to define the wall thickness, and removed the bulk of the inside of each half with power carving tools. He then chip-carved those surfaces to produce a pleasing texture. Although most of the interior will be hidden by the seed sprout, Graeme typically chip-carves the entire



surface as practice to improve his carving skills. While not done during the demo, the edges of each half would then be sanded flat, and possibly embellished in some way, to complete the fabrication process.





Using these halves and a finished sprout from another pod as guides, Melissa drew the rough form for the slightly curved sprout on a piece of

straight-grain wood, and rough cut it to shape on the bandsaw. Its shape was refined using carving tools so that it fit into the pod halves in the desired way. Once fit was good, screws were driven through each pod half from the back into the sprout to hold it all together.












The pod was then disassembled so various surface embellishments could be applied, such as texturing, torching, and coloring.

Graeme and Melissa spent the remainder of the demo sharing some of the many surface embellishment techniques they use to create their beautiful works of art. In addition to carving, texturing and woodburning most of are familiar with, they use many materials and techniques to add color to their work. Color is often applied in layers and various techniques (e.g., wiping while wet, sanding after drying, rapid drying to cause bubbles) are used to reveal the layers. Sometimes, multiple colors are applied in one layer and blended together at the transition from one to the next via wiping or brushing.

Some of their embellishing "tools of the trade" are shown in the photos below. These include acrylic artists paints, boot black (Kiwi, of course), milk paint, gel mediums (for texturing), painting brushes, tooth brushes, fine wire burnishing brushes, cloth rags, power carving tools and burrs, and wood burning pens and tips (many hand-made).











Although I was unable to attend the class on Friday, based on the project pieces produced by those who did attend (see photo below), the class was outstanding as well.
