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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE





close to the chuck at a bad angle. I knew it was a bad plan, but thought I was experienced and capable enough to pull it off, only to have a nice catch, sending my tool tip skating into the chuck, which caught the tool, lifted it, and slammed it back on the tool rest at 2000 RPM with my finger between the tool and the tool rest. I guess I'll have to remember to listen to that little voice when it says, "Don't do it".

The funeral urn was fun, as I used my seldom-used threading jig, and did the hollowing with a captured bar hollowing system which I made from mild steel and a cutter made from an old planer blade, bending and brazing the parts with an oxy-acetylene torch. Over a ten-year period color took over, and wood has become a means to create a shape in sculpture as an underlying basis for his art. Color has become the impetus for the art itself.

His work resides in US cities as well as other countries including Canada, Australia, Austria, Scotland, England, the Netherlands, China and Japan.

TURNIN' N LEARNIN' — CHAPTER 9 by Mike Porter

Hi, once again, fellow "Learnin' Turners". This past month, I discovered a new favorite wood...basswood. Yes, basswood. I can hear the thoughts now...huh? Why would he want to turn with basswood? That soft, punky stuff that shreds and tears so easily? What's it good for? Only wood carvers use that stuff. Yuk!

I discovered it by accident, having bought a sample grab box of spindle pieces at Woodcraft for \$25. I needed more wood to turn snowmen as ornament gifts, so I tried it. It is light colored for snowmen, OK, check. It cuts easily and fast, OK, good for doing repetitive objects, check. But you need a sharp tool to avoid tearing, oh, OK...sharpening practice, check. Due to its softness, catches are less dramatic...not so traumatic, OK, check. Not too pricey when I ruin a piece, OK, check. Very soft so I only need sand with 240 grit and higher, OK, check. Then it hit me...I was having fun with it! I quickly gained confidence using it and was able to crank out many pieces in a short time. This wood, I surmised, might work well with first time learnin' turners.

My daughter came over with her two kiddos to bake Xmas cookies with Grammy. I took my daughter out to the shop to introduce her to turning. I showed her how to mount a piece of basswood between centers, how to take it to round and turned her loose. She mastered the spindle roughing gouge quickly. Then I took a chance with the skew...my large Alan Lacer skew. She did it! She planed that blank as smooth as could be with not a catch. I've never seen a bigger smile on her face! On her next visit, I'll have her doing beads and coves. So, my learning here is that this wood is useful for learning as a first time introduction to putting tool to spinning wood. I'm going to do a repeat when my grandsons arrive for the holidays. Basswood has earned its place in my wood inventory. Do you have a favorite learning wood?

BRANCH BOWL by Denvy Larson

I saw this type of bowl in *Woodturning Designs*, a magazine which is no longer in print. The wood may be birch – anyone out there know? I started with branches, so my first step was to whip out the chain saw, and chaps, ear muffs, and goggles, and cut them about 12 inches long. After about a week, I used the band saw to rip off four sides to make all pieces about 1-1/2 inches square. Next, they went into an Ex-Caliber Food Dehydrator for two weeks on a setting of Hi (meat). After drying I let them sit in a box for a year – actually from neglect, too many irons in the fire.

Upon rediscovering the box, I ripped all pieces on the table saw to get them square -- roughly 1-1/8" by 1-1/8" – so they could be glued together to make a board. You now can see where I was going...a bowl from a board. But-I have put a twist on this project which made it easier for me.

After gluing pieces together to make a "board" 12"x12" and consistently thick, about 1 1/8". To reduce sanding, I cut a circle about 9-1/2 inches in diameter, and I proceeded to flatten it with my 36 grit, 3"x21" Makita belt sander. After it was sort of flat, I proceeded with my home-made drum

sander (plans from *Shop Notes* magazine) to make the "board" really flat.

Next, I attached a round, chuckable scrap block in the center of my board with four 1-1/4" long deck screws and Titebond glue (don't like it when things fly around the shop). I let the glue cure for a couple of days, then mounted it on the lathe. The "twist" is that I put my roofing square on my lathe tool rest, so the parting tool could easily plunge through the board at a consistent 45 degree angle. After stacking and gluing the rings, my favorite Easy Wood Tool made quick work of shaping the outside and inside. My 1-inch curved tool and a final touch of my scraper made from a file finished the job. I once heard it said: "Anyone can turn when they have 80 grit sand paper." Well, I started sanding with a 36 grit sanding disc on my electric drill!!! Then CA, dust, more CA, more dust, more sanding all the way to 400 grit – this is going to be a salad bowl, not go into some gallery. By now, I'm getting hungry for some Mediterranean Salad! I used an old piece of plywood with a chuckable disc on it to reverse turn the bottom to remove the screw holes.


After it was done, LaDon, my wonderful wife came up with a winner of an idea for my next one: "Why not put the pieces in a board so the grain goes north and south instead of horizontal?" That got me to thinking...I have enough scraps left over to make one of those...just imagine what that would look like! Turn safe and turn creatively.
