For this month's demo, we have another talent for you who can take a piece of wet wood and turn a cowboy hat shape — actually, Jerry Harris can turn a real, full-sized cowboy hat that a person can wear! At our meeting you will see Jerry demonstrate the steps to make a 6-inch diameter hat. He and I worked through a dry run at his shop the other day and I very much enjoyed it. Jerry was my first wood turning teacher when I took his class at the Multnomah Arts Center nearly 4 years ago now. I hope you will be motivated to stretch your imagination and skills a bit after you see Jerry's demo and try this for yourself.

## AAW JUNE 2018 SYMPOSIUM NEWS by Dale Larson

I want to thank Steve Newberry for letting me talk about the upcoming AAW symposium in Portland June 14-17, 2018. And I want to thank the three members of Northwest that came up after the meeting and volunteered to lead a committee. Starting in January, or so, the AAW office will have an on-line place for members to sign up to help out with each committee. I will send that link out when I have it. As of now we have five committee chairs I am trying to find volunteers for. Here they are with a short description of the work involved. If you have questions please feel free to call me.

Packet Stuffing. This committee generally works on Tuesday before the symposium helping fill and organize the packets each attendee will receive. One nice thing about this committee is that all the work is done before the symposium happens.

Spouse tours. This is work that needs to be done in the next couple of months. We need a local person to help the office locate and find local tours that attendees and spouses can take while here in Portland. General ideas here include a bus tour to Vista house/Multnomah falls, a bus tour to the Rose Garden/Japanese Park, or boat tours on the Willamette.

Craft Area. This area at the symposium is a place for spouses to work on their crafts during the demonstrations. We help organize demonstrations such as quilting or other craft projects that might be of interest to spouses. If a local member has a spouse that is a crafter, this is a place they could help out.

Youth Training Aids. Here the job is to help find turners that are willing to help out in the youth turning area. A lot of attendees coming in from out of the area will volunteer to help here. This lead position is to monitor and coordinate the volunteers so all the rotations are covered.

Demonstrator Assistants. Similar to Youth Training aids. Here the job is to help monitor and coordinate the volunteers that help out in the demonstration rooms.

## LIBRARY NEWS

Jim Blaho of *Artisan Ideas* (<a href="https://www.artisanideas.com/">https://www.artisanideas.com/</a>) donated a book to our library this month: <a href="https://www.artisanideas.com/">Add-ing Spice To Your Woodturning</a>, by Chris West.

The book format has an ideal protective hard cover which is spiral bound such that it's easy to use in the workshop without fighting the binding. In addition to presenting 20 projects for the kitchen and table, there are good sections on health and safety, tools, wood, and other basics. Projects are labeled indicating level of difficulty such that someone new to turning may choose where to start although this is not a book about the techniques of turning cylinders, coves, or beads. The photos and diagrams are excellent. Most all of the book shows how you can incorporate other special interests into your project, making your turnings more special to recipients of a gift, or to potential customers making a purchase.

## TURNIN' N LEARNIN' — CHAPTER 19 by Mike Porter

Hi, once again, fellow "Learnin' Turners. Here's a question you don't want to read..."How many days until the holiday season is upon us?" Oh no, you say, not now, we just had Halloween and Thanksgiving isn't here yet! However, if you are going to participate in the holiday bazaars that will start in November and go into December, you better need to be turning right now to create your inventory. This year I will be participating in my first such event, sharing a table with Jim Schoeffel on November 4<sup>th</sup> at Mountain View Middle School in Beaverton. So, here are a few things I've experienced in building up my inventory.

I know I can make coffee scoops that sell; it's my anchor product that many people really like. Sold some 50 of them last spring as you may recall me writing. Made another 20 or so lately. The scoop cups and the handles can be made of the small pieces of wood you have saved. I use a different wood for each part and label the product with a small tag. People like to see what they're made of. I sell mine for \$15 easily. Nick Cook sells his for \$18 each.

After watching Dan Tilden's demo last month, I decided to try using a glue block for the first time. I have a shelf of small pieces of myrtle that I bought at the Coast last June for \$.25 each. I made toothpick holders and will sell them for \$10 each. Also used up some small pieces of maple burl and dogwood. Now, the glue block thing was good learning. It's a fast process. However, I did not turn my waste block with side grain for the piece to glue against; I used a spindle piece of maple. After two glue-joint separations, I reread my notes from the Tilden demo and realized he glues side grain to the turned piece. The waste block likely has some side grain tear out which provides a rougher surface for the CA glue to adhere to. So, I used my belt sander to create a rough, but flat surface for the nice wood to glue against. I used the tailstock as pressure for drying and kept it there until I needed to bore out the inside. Worked fine; no more joint failures while turning. If you part off the small piece cleanly at the glue joint there is minimal to no sanding needed on the bottom. I sanded these wet with walnut oil. Now that's a new skill I have, and a useful one that I have confidence in for future turnings.

Ornaments: As I wrote a year ago, I used basswood to make icicle snowmen and more normally shaped snow men and women as pairs. This year I painted the hats and decorated them a bit more. I'm thinking I may charge \$15 each or 2 for \$25? Also, for fun I turned a baseball bat, an ice cream cone and two acorns. Painted these and will price them to sell and see if I get any buyers. I'm test marketing.

Other items: I also turned a bunch of honey dippers, but frankly, it was more spindle practice for me, and I don't expect to sell many, even at \$5 each. If they don't sell I may give them away. If time allows I may turn a few spinning tops and decorate them with a Sharpie.

So, the main learning experience for me has been in doing production to meet a commitment, and will be participating in a craft fair and interacting with the public. The repetitive spindle practice is always good. I'm becoming less a fan of using basswood as I had some challenges getting it to cut cleanly. More sanding was required than I'd like to do and it didn't take the paint as well as I wanted. I did seal the wood with Pens Plus before I applied acrylic paint but could have used thinned shellac or a cellulose sealer. Hmm... perhaps some of you could teach me something here. Now that the production run is behind me, I'll switch over to making gifts for the holidays. I already have my list! Do you? Happy and safe turning to you all!

The offices of Secretary and Treasurer may be occupied by the same person



## OCTOBER PROGRAM — DAN TILDEN reported by Mike Porter, photos by Bill Karow


The members and guests on October 5<sup>th</sup> were treated to the demonstration of a real artist, Dan Tilden, from Ashland. Dan apprenticed, as he likes to say, with Christian Burchard. Dan was introduced to turning at the Ashland High School woodshop where he caught the bug and has been turning ever since. In the demo for us, the influence of Christian was evident. Dan takes a piece of wood and studies it to see what the piece suggests. He asks himself several questions. Can the bark or natural edge shape be incorporated? Should I bleach the wood or leave it natural? Dan frequently hollows his pieces and on this night, he chose a piece of natural edge burl wood for his demonstration. Dan showed us how he uses a glue block so that he can use as much of the good wood as possible. The glue block is made for mounting in cross-grain orientation (like a bowl blank) so side grain will be the glue surface. The glue block is sanded smooth and flat on the glue surface and the wood blank is sanded smooth and flat on the bottom. He used medium CA glue, applied it liberally, rubbed the joint surfaces together, separated them and then misted a bit of accelerator onto the surfaces. He then pressed the burl against the waste block and used the tail stock to apply pressure. In minutes he was turning the burl, but kept the tailstock in place for stability and as a bit of insurance because the piece was not symmetrical.



in all that he does. He demonstrated his stance and body movements. After the outside of the piece was established he moved to the hollowing using a round nosed cutter tipped tool. At the white board, Dan explained his sequence of cuts in the hollowing process, and then took the work as far as he could in the time allowed. From this writer's viewpoint we witnessed a woodturning talent that has a great future ahead!














## **OCTOBER CHALLENGE & SHOW-n-TELL**



## **2018 BASIC SPINDLE TURNING COURSE**

The **Southwest Washington Woodturner's Club** is hosting a Basic Spindle Turning Course consisting of ten 4-hour class sessions over the year with 40 total training hours. Due to space and lathe restrictions, course participation is limited to four students with a minimum enrollment of three.

The course covers basic spindle turning principles completely. Making each of the exercise pieces provides knowledge, understanding and ability to correctly use the tools. Each exercise utilizes the skew chisel. This course is for the skew-phobic. It is a major player and by the end of the course, a beloved friend. There is no escaping the tool in this course, no matter what the plans of the pupil might be.

The arrangement and the exercises of the course are from a woodturning instruction manual for school shop teachers titled *Elementary Turning*, written by Frank H. Selden and first published in 1907.


## WHERE: Rick's shop in Yacolt, WA – directions provided to participants.
