While setting up a new computer recently, I had to go through my collection of pictures. I found this one of Bob Tuck.



And certainly, the red suspenders were a constant item year round. Bob taught all of us to turn, in one sense or another.

Next time you visit Woodcrafters, notice the large banner with Bob's picture over the lathe area. That gives you a sense of the influence Bob had on local woodturning.

Seeing Bob again started me thinking about my relationship with him as a mentor. Although at this time I was already an experienced turner with many years at the lathe, I remember how hard it was to ask Bob questions about turning in the beginning. My reticence was completely unfounded because, although the term curmudgeon could've been applied to Bob, he loved to talk about woodturning. Once the conversation was started, it progressed through every subsequent meeting. He knew pretty much everything about every kind of wood, every kind of tool, every project and anything else you might want to know about woodturning.

If we could get every turner upon whom Bob exerted an influence in one place, we would have a very impressive set of demonstrators.

They would sort the game out on their own, as we did, for the most part, as kids. While I think this would have put a lot more fun in the game, I'm also pretty sure the teaching aspect would have come up short.

Which brings me back to the point I want to make about woodturning.

Standing at the lathe making mistakes is an essential element of the training process. But, being able ask somebody a question is not only more fun but also provides the sense of camaraderie that we all can enjoy. Besides, it's just a lot more efficient to avoid mistake than make them all yourself.

When you need to know something about woodturning, someone in the club can provide you an answer. Ask the question!

Sharp tools are better for your health! I have been experiencing an annoying pain in my right elbow. After months of home remedies (ignoring it and hoping it goes away), I finally went to see a sports medicine doctor. Turns out that I have a torn tendon in my right elbow! It is what is commonly called "tennis elbow" or "RSI" (repetitive strain injury). So after a cortisone shot to relieve some of the discomfort, the doctor says this can take up to a year to heal. Well, if you are right handed, how often do you need your right elbow when turning? All the time!

I took a few days away from the lathe to allow the cortisone to work and when I started turning again, I noticed that as my tool started losing its edge, I was pushing harder and aggravating the torn tendon. As soon as I sharpened my tool, the discomfort was reduced or went away completely. Whether you are roughing or finishing, please make sure your tool is sharp! I have come to believe that regardless of what angle you prefer on your tools, it is more important that they are sharp!

November will be Carl Jacobson. Carl will demonstrate turning with carbide tools.


December there is no meeting.

Should be a great demonstration!







OCTOBER'S TURNING TEASER — QUESTION



Each month, if space allows (and we don't run out of material), we'll show you a photo and ask a question or two about it.

We'll let you think about it for a month, then give you our thoughts in the next newsletter.

October Question:

Review the September Question. Which two holes can safely be reused? Why would you want to do that?

(Answer will appear in the October newsletter.)

SEPTEMBER'S TURNING TEASER — ANSWER



September's Question:

You have a large bowl blank of green oak (or walnut or maple), and plan to mount it to the lathe using your 6" diameter faceplate that has 18 screw holes in it. How many screws do you use and why?

Answer: Ten screws. As the wood seasons and distorts, the screw holes in the faceplate will not align properly with all of the screw holes in the roughed out, seasoned blank. Remounting using all of the same holes will inevitably put shearing stresses on the screws that can lead to failure of the screw. Using half the screw holes available plus one will leave you free to remount after seasoning the blank using fresh holes for all but two of the screws.

Two Notes: This tactic does not apply to smaller faceplates with fewer holes, nor does it apply if you plan to re-mount the seasoned blank using a spigot-and-chuck approach.


