

A "MEEK" MAPLE BOWL . DAVE WOOD



Rumor has it that in about 1840, an Oregon pioneer, mountain man, lawman and politician named Joseph Meek planted a maple tree on his Oregon country homestead just north of today's Hillsboro. Some think it was actually his son, Courtney Meek, who did the planting, but in any case, the Meek Maple was the result. It grew for over 175 years and watched its home become part of the Oregon Territory and then the State of Oregon.

One of Meek's neighboring Hillsboro pioneer families was a Guenther ancestor, William Baldra. Don Guenther, relatively new NWWT member, and great-great grandson of Baldra, is active in the Hillsboro Historic Society, and was able to get a piece of the Meek Maple which had died and lay spalting for several years. As it happens, Joseph Meek's great-great granddaughter, Judy Goldman, still lives on the

family land and is passionately dedicated to preserving the history of the valley and her family's role in it. Don spearheaded a plan to turn a bowl from the Meek Maple's wood and present it to Judy at the 2022 annual Hillsboro Historic Society meeting.

Don asked Dave Wood for help in creating a museum-grade memorial bowl for presentation at the ceremony held on June 27 at the Historic Shute Farm.







Intensely spalted with quilting and even some bird's eye features, it is truly a beautiful piece of wood. It had decayed more than ideal, so a couple coats of MinWax Wood Hardener, very sharp gouges, and 1100 RPM lathe speed allowed us to accomplish very smooth inside and outside surfaces with only a few minor pits from the punky spots. The bowl is 14" in diameter and 6" tall, including the foot. It was finished with four coats of wipe-on polyurethane, steel-wooled between each coat.

The ceremony was MC'd by the president of the Hillsboro Historical Society, who yielded the microphone for our own silver-tongued Don Guenther for the presentation to Judy. Her dedication to preserving her family and community heritage in the booming construction of the northern Tualatin Valley is genuine, and her smile is contagious.

On behalf of the Northwest Woodturners, congratulations Judy!

GENERAL MEETING RAFFLE · KIM TALLEY

Now that we are meeting in-person, we will have our traditional raffle. Hopefully many of you will have a backlog of items you can donate for the raffle. This year we are going to change the format to make it go faster.

Kim Talley, who manages our monthly raffle, will take the donations as soon as they arrive and sort them into twelve piles of approximately equal value or some other distribution method. These piles can have several small, nice pieces, one large piece or anything else that the manager decides.

In front of each pile is a cup. The raffle participants buy their tickets and put their ticket in the cup in front of the pile for which they are placing a bid. (If no one bids on a pile, the wood is distributed between other piles with bidders.)

After the meeting, Kim will draw a ticket from each cup and announce the winner of that pile.

The winner claims the prize, and we all go home. If the bidders want to put one ticket in every cup or all their tickets in one cup, it's up to them.





bottom, not so good. The blending of colors worked well for the red and yellow but the blue and green did not. I should have used a finer black pen.

Better thin wall turning — the goal was 2 mm or less which was not consistent. The closer to the tenon, the thicker the wood. There is a big difference between 2 and 3 mm when using the NSK as the tiny burrs can get stuck and break easily. The rim is 3 mm on purpose for strength.

As some of you may know, May and June have been a rough month for me with a ruptured disk and spinal infection. The infection is gone, and the disks are improving but still not able to lift heavy items – heavy being over about 5-10 pounds. So, the large blanks drying in my shop will have to wait but to avoid Turning Withdrawal, I worked on small thin pieces. Inspired by Kathleen Duncan, our local piercing expert, I worked on some small items only weighing ounces rather than pounds.

Turning thin for piercing requires walls in the 2 mm or less range (1.5 mm is ideal). Consider 3 mm for the rims if people will be picking it up there (see the platter below). I used the NSK Presto air-driven hand piece which runs at 320,000 rpm. I've done several pieces before but wanted to explore what is called negative and positive spaces.

Negative space is the holes and positive space is an object, in this case butterflies.

In this first piece, the item is about 3" x 3" maple, dyed magenta, and then finished with spray lacquer.

The second piece is a 5" platter turned to 2 mm or less and then I used a butterfly template to color it. It was an experiment that could have turned out better. The coloring was with <u>Tombow Dual Brush Pens</u> which are water based and have a flexible brush tip and a fine-point, hard nylon tip. For the black, I used India Ink. Finishing was again spray lacquer.


What I learned:

Better planning — there was the tenon on the back side of the second piece which cannot be pierced so the butterfly should be higher to cover more of the tenon and above the wings should all be stippling.

Better coloring — the pens worked well for the top wings but the


Sharpening Lathe Tools Class graduates four more!

Our final training course of the first half of this year was held on June 4, and taught by Mike Meredith, whose background in metallurgy, chemistry, and teaching makes for an in-depth presentation and discussion on tool steels. Mike also has extensive experience with all of the popular sharpening systems and accessories.

Dave Wood assisted with some "how to" on free-hand sharpening, especially the 40/40 bowl gouge grind.

John Sutter, who has extensive experience with tool and pattern making, knows his way around grinding and sharpening systems and stepped up as general assistant and coach for this session.

The four students were new member Tony Vinciguerra (Welcome, Tony!), Ed Vachal, Kevin Wheeler, and Doug Pizac.



We had three Wolverine grinding stations and one Kodiak set-up, so everyone had their own dedicated and equipped grinder. Ed, another relatively new member, brought the components of his new Kodiak system and got some tutorial help from Mike on set-up and use. Like the Wolverine system, the Kodiak is a premium quality grinding system. Procedures for use are basically the same, but the apparatus is slightly different.



SHARPENING CLASS REVIEW · (CONT.)

This course focuses on six key areas of sharpening lathe tools:

- · Tool Steels
- Sharpening Systems
- Hands-on "How To" sharpen of all the different turning tools
- · Free-Hand Sharpening
- Honing cutting edges
- Handy gadgets for your sharpening station

The discussion on the best bevel angles for bowl gouges is always interesting because inevitably the questions is asked, "But what's the best angle for a bowl gouge?" It's fun for us instructors to say, "The best bevel angle is whatever you want it to be as long as it's consistently repeatable," knowing that the new turners don't yet know what they want it to be.





We then talked about the different grinds and angles and when to use them. We love having a bit of fun with folks new to turning. Fun, after all, is a big part of woodturning.

During lunch hour, we had a Q&A session and covered in more depth the best tool steel types, turning tool brands to buy, and appropriate sizes of the various turning tools for different types of woodturning pieces.

All together we sharpened a total of about forty tools – bowl and spindle gouges, rouging gouges, parting tools, scrapers of many different shapes, skews, and parting tools. We also learned how to get good burrs on scrapers and even tried them out on a practice bowl.

And as always, we learned the value of high-quality donuts and coffee to grease the wheels of learning and intellectual discussion while in pursuit of woodturning Nirvana!






