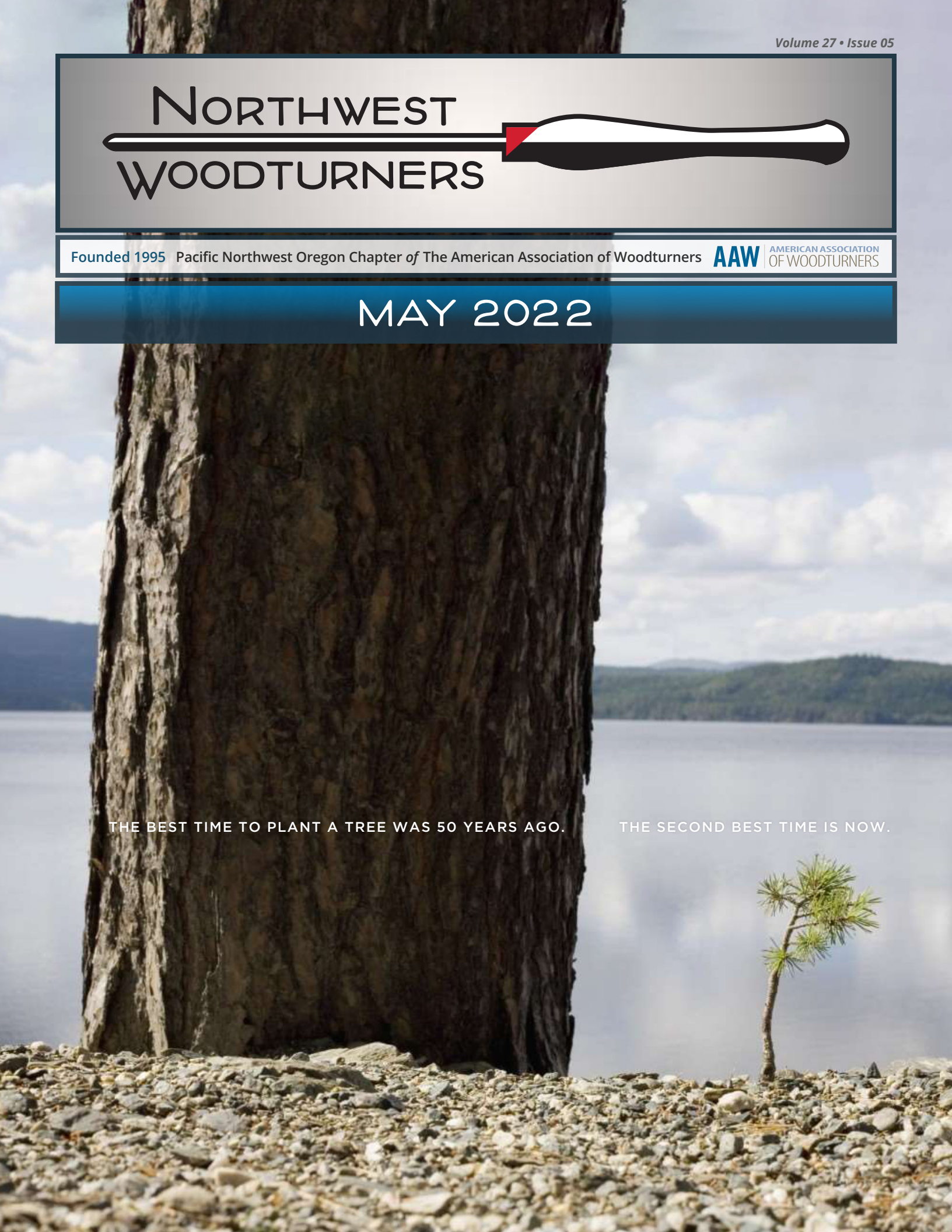

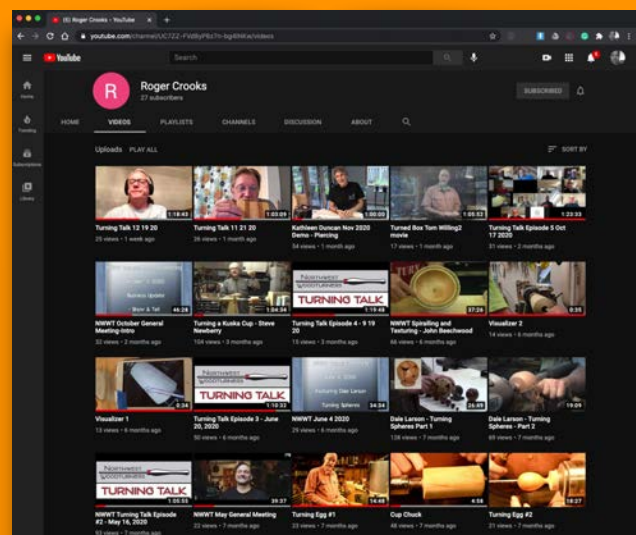

May Monthly Program Update

At our **May 5** meeting, **Tom Willing** will be demonstrating an Egg Wagon as just one example of a toy that can be turned. This should get us thinking of what we could do for NWWT's Toys for Kids program. It is always educational and entertaining to have Tom as a demonstrator in our club meetings.

"It has been over 50 years since Oregon artist Tom Willing created his first woodturning in his father's woodshop. Since then, he has come to focus on pieces that are sensitive to the interplay between light, form, and material. Working with both native and exotic species of woods, Willing seeks to

reveal the visual magic within each piece of timber with which he works. In addition to sculptural display work, he designs pieces that combine the aesthetic and functional – bowls, pepper grinders, platters and more. Willing's work is elegantly finished on the lathe with walnut oil and wax, then buffed to bring out the natural luster of the wood.



Willing holds his BA degree from the University of Oregon, an MA from the Ohio State University, and a MAT from Lewis and Clark University. He taught middle school in Newberg, Oregon, until retiring in 2013. He teaches woodturning workshops and is an active member of both Northwest Woodturners and the American Association of Woodturners. Willing lives in the Willamette Valley with his wife, watercolor artist Mary Burgess."

Better Tomorrow Bowls Project Update

So far, NWWT has collected and distributed 21 bowls and platters to family service agencies in Portland communities.

The feedback has been terrific. The coordinators at the agencies are all very surprised and amazed at such quality, meaningful gifts that they can give to those they serve.

Bowls can be dropped on at any in-person activity such as Open Shops and Classes, or contact me directly to arrange for picking up. Bowls can be any species or design, 10" - 12" fruit bowl size, with a food safe finish. You can sign, date, and label with species if you want. If all members can contribute 2 or 3 bowls, we can easily reach our goal of 300 total.

BASICS CLASS

Bowl Turning Basics Class

Requirements and General Information:

- Proof of Vaccination is required
- Students must be members of NWWT
- Class will be limited to six students – one per lathe
- Instructors are experienced NWWT members
- Three sharpening systems will be available
- All wood will be supplied
- Students bring their own PPE (face shields, dust protection)
- Coffee and snacks will be provided, but bring your own lunch
- If you have any COVID related symptoms, please do not register or if you have symptoms on the day of the class, please let us know and a full refund will be sent.

Course Objective:

The primary objective of this course is to walk beginners through making a wooden bowl. This course is targeted at people who have never turned wood, or who want to take a refresher course before advancing on to the next level of bowl turning expertise.

Prerequisite woodturning skills: None required

Agenda:

Morning

- Sharpening the tools required for class with help from the instruction staff.
- Mount a green blank between centers; flatten bowl bottom surface; cut a tenon
- Mount blank in a chuck

Lunch Hour

- Demonstrations and Q&A session during lunch

Afternoon

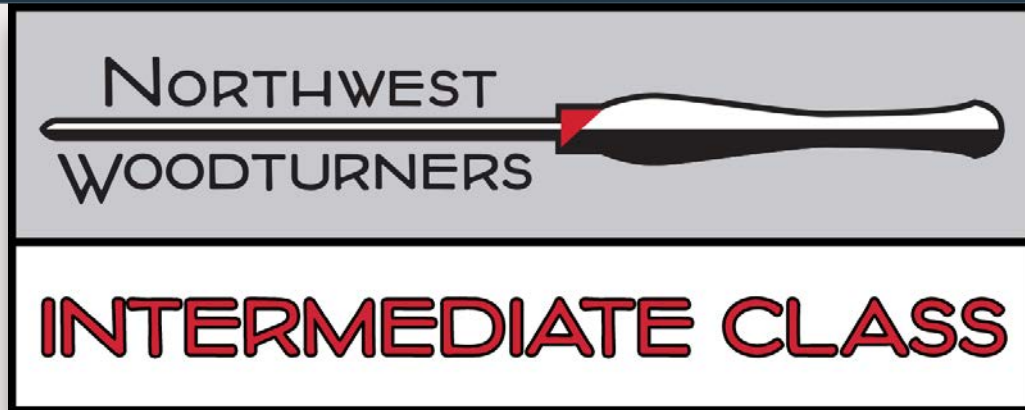
- Instruction on the basic push-cut and pull-cut techniques
- Cut the exterior shape and interior surface, and smooth with scraper
- Reverse the bowl and finish cut the bottom
- Start a second bowl (time permitting) to finish at home
- Each student will take home one bowl and one blank for practice.

Tools you need to bring:

- Bowl Gouge: 1/2" or 5/8"
- Scraper – left-hand French curve style for inside bowl surface. A round-nose scraper is acceptable.
- Parting tool or Skew – for touching up tenons and recesses for bowl mounting

Note: If you do not have any tools yet, loaner tools are available. We recommend you wait until after the class to buy tools so you know what to buy and what not to buy.

BOWL TURNING INTERMEDIATE CLASS • MAY 21



Bowl Turning Intermediate Class

Requirements and General Information:

- Proof of Vaccination is required
- Students must be members of NWWT
- Class will be limited to six students – one per lathe
- Instructors are experienced NWWT members
- Three sharpening stations will be available
- All wood will be supplied
- Students bring their own PPE (face shields, dust protection)
- Coffee and snacks will be provided, but bring your own lunch
- If you have any COVID related symptoms, please do not register or if you have symptoms on the day of the class, please let us know, and a full refund will be sent.

Course Objective:

The primary objective of this course is to refine your skills in the finer details of bowl turning and advance you to the next level of expertise. You should already know how to mount and turn a bowl inside and out with reasonable efficiency. If you have not yet developed these skills, please do not register for this course.

Each student should complete two bowls in class, not including sanding and finish application.

Prerequisite woodturning skills:

- Efficient ability to prepare and mount a bowl blank between centers and in a chuck using a tenon or a recess
- Efficient ability to shape the outside and inside of a bowl

- Basic sharpening skills for a bowl gouge and a scraper
- Ability to complete a basic bowl except for sanding and applying finish

Agenda:

Morning

- Tune-up/sharpen tools for the class with help from the staff.
- Presentation on advanced design and form concepts, shape, rims, bottoms
- Review of bowl gouge grinds: 40/40, traditional (50°), bottom (65°-75°), Ellsworth, etc.
- Mounting options: when to use a tenon or recess
- Turn a "once-turned" bowl through the finish-cutting stage with a green blank

Lunch Hour

- Additional Demonstrations and Q&A session

Afternoon

- Turn a roughed and dried bowl blank supplied (or bring your own) to the point of final scraping
- Learn methods for truing warped tenon or recess for re-mounting
- Learn methods of cutting thinner wall thickness
- Learn methods of scraping thin-walled bowls
- Sanding and finish application if time permits

Tools you need to bring:

- Bowl gouge(s) – 1/2" or 5/8" are good sizes. If you have several with different grinds, bring them all.
- Bowl scraper – left hand French curve style is ideal for inside, but a round-nose also works
- Parting tool or skew for fine-tuning tenons/recesses

- Explain sharpening bowl gouges, spindle gouges, parting tools, and skewers

- Sharpen your tools with help from instructors

OREGON CARVERS GUILD • ROGER CROOKS

As you get proficient in your woodturning skills, the next step for many people is how to enhance or embellish your work, whether it's a bowl, box, platter, or other item. Coloring can be done with dyes or paint. Pyrography is fun, and options are limitless. But one of the most spectacular enhancements is carving – either by hand or with power tools such as Dremels, micromotors, or a variety of other tools.

Carving options are as varied as the different types of turning. Many turners start thinking about making a pen or a bowl, but as we all know, that is just the tip of the iceberg of what you can do on a lathe.

Carving is the same. There are many specialties in carving that are too numerous to list here. However, for us turners, some very simple carvings can make a huge difference in your piece. You have seen many different carving examples from club members during our monthly Show & Tell presentations.

Carving the outside of a bowl adds a new dimension to your work. Adding color to that work makes a dramatic effect. See photos below.

We have formed the [Oregon Carvers Guild](#) about a year and half ago, taking over the former Carver's Club that went from several hundred members to about a dozen and with the Carver's Special Interest Group from the Guild of Oregon Woodworkers.

Dues are only \$30, and the vast majority of demos and classes have been free or very low cost. OCG will have a 25' booth at Gathering of the Guilds in May, doing demonstrations and selling some incredible pieces of art created by our members.

I love carving, but my skills are limited which is one reason I joined the OCG board as VP. I encourage you to check us out and join us at oregoncarvers.com.

AAW • ANNUAL CALL FOR BOARD NOMINEES

AAWAMERICAN ASSOCIATION
OF WOODTURNERS**The AAW Board of Directors**

The AAW has a volunteer nine-member Board of Directors to represent the membership and move the organization forward. These members are elected by the AAW members in August each year. Any member in good standing for the past three years is eligible to run, regardless of geographical location.

Becoming a Board Member

Do you have the leadership experience, time, energy, and ideas to be a part of AAW's operations, as well as a willingness to help make it a better organization? Be a part of moving the AAW forward – run for a position on the AAW Board of Directors.

The Board is most effective with a diversity of skills represented. Members with experience, such as working with nonprofit organizations, especially in the areas of finance, strategic planning, nonprofit governance, or legal matters, are especially encouraged to apply. In your candidate statement it is more important to emphasize your business and interpersonal skills rather than your woodturning skills.

After a review of application materials and conducting phone interviews, the Nominating Committee will select six qualified candidates from the applicants. From these six, members will elect two Board members, and the Board will appoint a third Board member, to serve three-year terms beginning the following January.

If you are interested in serving on the Board, send the following information to the Executive Director (phil@woodturner.org) by email no later than May 1st:

- **Current resume**
- **A statement of intent, 300 words or less, including qualifications and reasons for applying. Applications demonstrating past nonprofit organization experience and leadership are highly desirable.**
- **Letters of recommendation from two individuals who can confirm your organizational and leadership abilities.**
- **A high-resolution head-and-shoulders photograph of yourself.**

The Nominating Committee will review the application materials and schedule phone interviews in May and early June. Six candidates for the three open Board seats will be presented in the *American Woodturner* journal, along with photos. The AAW will assist the six candidates in producing a brief individual video statement which will be posted to the AAW website. Online voting will occur during the month of August, and election results will be announced in early September.

Approximate Time Involvement

Three face-to-face board meetings each year, expenses paid by the AAW. One Board meeting will be held in conjunction with the AAW Annual International Symposium (normally in June or July), extending the meeting to about 10 days. The other two annual meetings are usually Friday through Sunday afternoon in January and November.

- Two hours or less on a Zoom board meeting call each month.
- Check e-mail daily.
- Stay current with website information.
- Serve on 2 or 3 committees and chair no more than 2 (see Bylaws). This work runs in spurts but averages about 1 to 3 hours per day.
- Additionally, we believe it the responsibility of a Board member to interact with the AAW membership by attending chapter functions and local symposiums whenever possible.

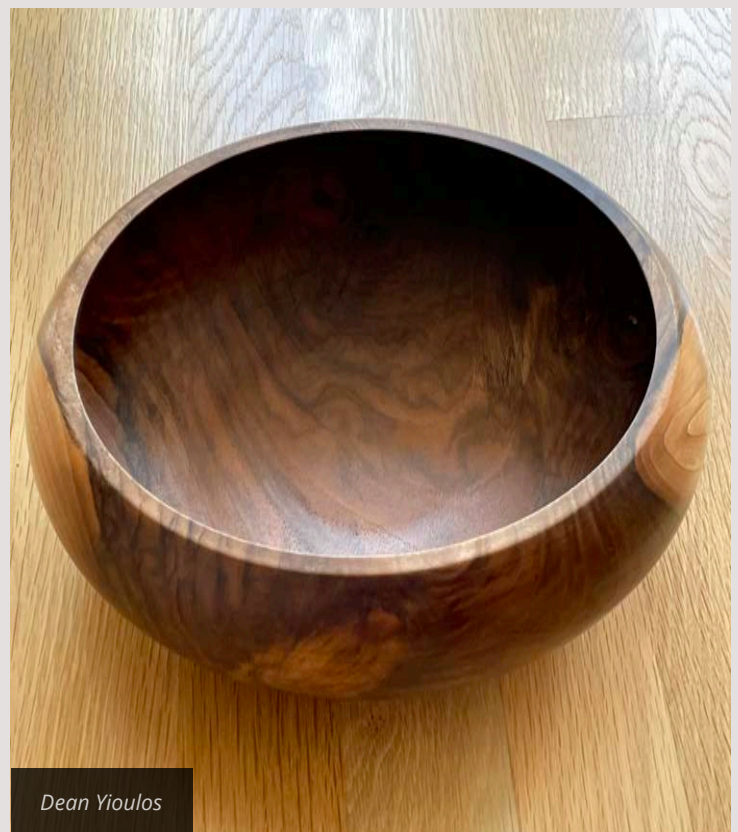
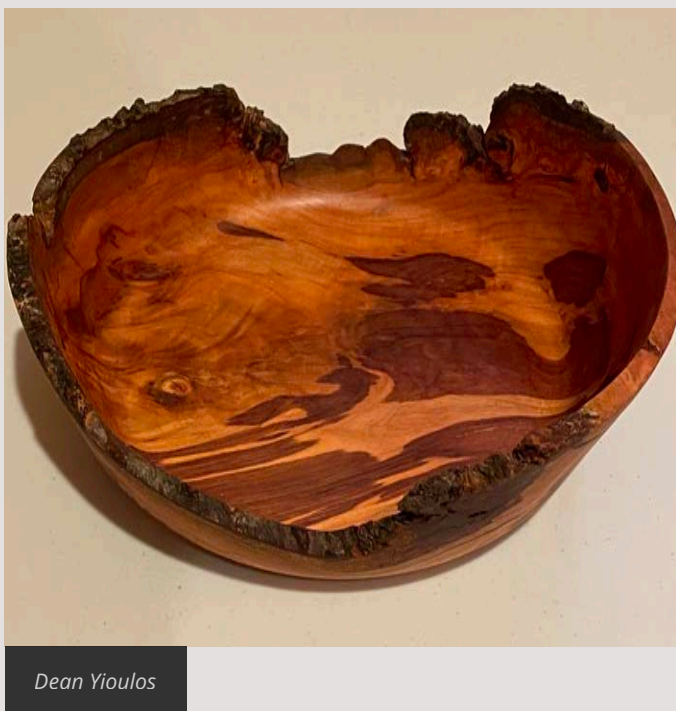
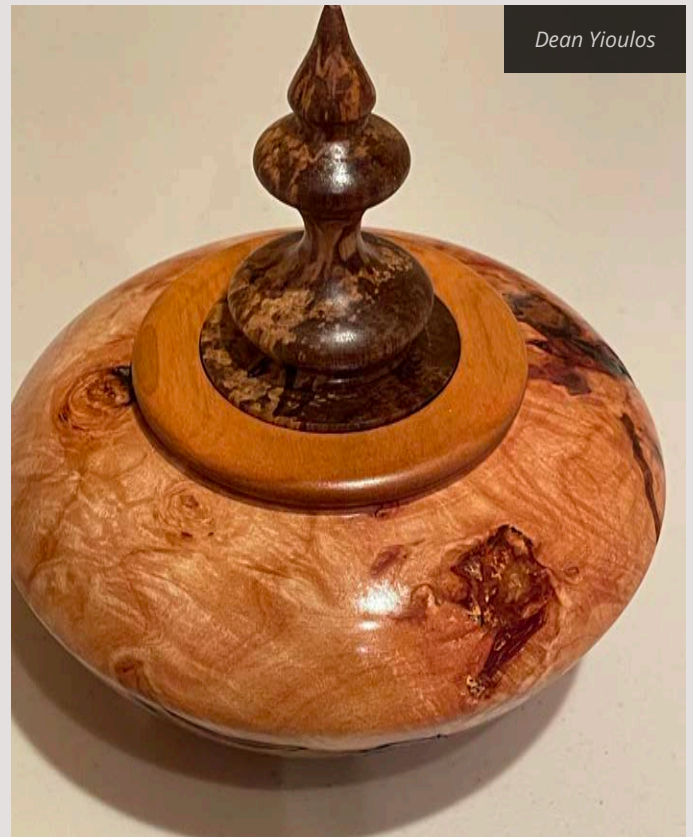
I'm also looking forward to resuming our in-person meetings, so that we can all experience the Show-n-Tell and Challenge pieces firsthand.
