APRIL PROGRAM — **TERRY GERROS** — Making Twists on the Lathe

Terry Gerros, Vice President of Willamette Valley Woodturners in Salem and Chairman of the 2015 Oregon Woodturning Symposium last year, will demonstrate the process of cutting twists on the lathe. He will:

- Provide an explanation of the twist language and how to understand the marking-out process.
- Show the proper way to mark out a twist to simplify cutting it.
- Demonstrate the process of cutting twists with both hand and power tools.

This demo is not to produce a finished piece, but rather show how simple it is to cut a twist, so you can try it out at home. A handout on the process will be available.

TURNIN' N LEARNIN' — CHAPTER 3 by Mike Porter

Hi again fellow turners...yes, the learning has continued. I have enough material to fill the entire newsletter, but I'll spare you that treat and go into True Turner Confessions mode.

Yes, I was not a member of AAW for over a year after I joined our club. And yes, I was asked about it by a member...several times, and yes, I did go on their website to see what I could get for free. Not much, so I put it off. Then finally in resignation... "Oh, OK, I'll join to see what the others are talking about." And was I surprised, and pleasantly so.

I had started creating a spreadsheet comparison of all lathes I might be interested in buying, then I found that on the AAW website, someone had already done it! So, I downloaded it and will give it my personal tweak.

I had bought 3 Richard Raffan DVD's in December when they were on special with free shipping. OK, they're fine and I like them a lot, but then I found so many more videos are available on the AAW site for free!

I am planning on buying a book on wood turning as reference available in my workshop, then I found the area on the website that is loaded with articles for free!

I've been struggling with how to know which tools to buy and then I found several articles such as "Guide to Gouges" that are so helpful.

I just bought a new Nova G3 chuck and spare jaws on sale through Shopsmith, then I found the article on chucks that would have influenced my decision had I read it first.

I don't have a right angle power sander, but I found an article on sanding that will help me decide what to buy, and if I really need one.

Sharpening – I've written about how I've discovered how important that skill is, AND, yep, you guessed it, I found two very helpful articles on that topic.

Safety? Wow, I am so impressed at how much AAW stresses safety. Sometimes standing at the lathe freaks me out, especially when I get a bad catch as I wrote a while back. Reading the first few articles on safety has helped my confidence and had me realize to approach my learning in a slow, methodical manner. Don't rush it. The experience and skills will come.

And I haven't even mentioned the magazine and other monthly publications.

So, fellow NWWT turners, if you are not a member of AAW, I highly recommend you join. I asked the AAW folks about our club membership and they reported back that 80 from our 93 club members are signed up! Great support! So, if you're not yet an AAW member, try it for a year. 








Black Locust, also known as Pseudo Acacia and as Robinia, is a great alternative to the endangered hardwoods from tropical countries. In fact, the Rainforest Alliance promotes the use of Black Locust, readily available here in the US, for outdoor projects and boats.





Is it true that Abe Lincoln chopped Black Locust to make fence posts? So goes the legend. Black Locust is a tough wood with a willingness to be steambent. Its color, different from many of the other woods we carry, ranges from greenish-yellow to dark brown. Its grain is open, dense, and beautiful.
