PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - MIKE PORTER



At the Tool Rest

January 2019...wow, really? I remember as a young boy thinking the year 2000 was so far away. Then I'd calculate my age on that New Year's Day and would always come up with 54. Well, now I'm 73, it's well past the year 2000, and find myself, fortunately, in good health and able to explore the creativity of my chosen pursuits. And woodturning is one of two important creative pursuits that I am fortunate to enjoy.

What goes along with woodturning is the fun of sharing this creative hobby with you, the members of NWWT. I am very appreciative to be able to serve you as President for the next year. I am very appreciative for the Board members who chose to serve with me, and the list of helpful volunteers who all make this Club work.

I have titled this President's monthly message "At the Tool Rest" for a reason. I'm using this metaphor in this way. When we turn wood, we first select and prepare a blank...a piece of wood from a downed tree. We form it into a shape from which we will create something either useful or artistic. We mount it to the lathe in some way...chuck, glue block, double sticky tape, drive center. Then we stare at it for a minute, decide what we're going to do first, select the first tool, and perhaps the second we're going to use. Are they sharp and ready to cut? Then we bring up the tool rest and position it appropriately for our first cut. Before turning on the lathe we make sure that the piece will spin without conflict with the tool rest. If we haven't done so by now, we don the appropriate safety gear.

Then, what I find myself doing is I stop, pause, and think.....Have I thought of everything I need to do before I turn on the lathe? Is everything in place before I start this work to spinning and set the tool onto the tool rest? Is that work secure? Is the tool rest ready for me to anchor the tool? I visualize right then and there, while staring at the piece, what will its final shape be? How should I stand and hold the tool? These are my last steps before entering the zone...the zone of making shavings...the zone of creativity...the zone of creating form from wood. When I'm there, I am really there, fully engaged and everything around me falls away. I love being in that place. I want to come back there time and again. That is what keeps me in this craft, this hobby, and has me wanting to share with others and create a Club experience where you, all of you, share that experience.

Shared experience is a foundation of meaningful relationships. I can safely state that we all like woodturning, but it is the relationships we have in the Club with each other that is the glue that makes the Club work.

Have a great year in 2019...turn wood, do it safely and enjoy yourselves.

The Annual NWWT Sale & Swap is a great way to part with those tools that you seem to never use anymore and also make room for those tools you're going to buy from your fellow members!





WEBSITE OF THE MONTH

Urban Forestry Tree ID Map

Whenever I am outdoors - walking the dog, heading to my local coffee shop, or spending time in the park, I am constantly looking up at the numerous trees I encounter and trying to ID them by their their common name (and if I'm feeling adventurous, genus and species). I'm pretty good at the common ones, but there are a lot of trees that I haven't a clue what they are.

But I just found an immensely valuable website! Recently created by Portland Parks & Recreation, it's called the <u>Urban Forestry's Park Tree Inventory Webmap</u>. Click on the link and bookmark it on your web browser. Also, add it to your smartphone's homescreen for easy access when you're outside and see a tree you can't quite identify!



Data for this map was collected as part of the <u>Tree Inventory Project</u>, a partnership between Portland Parks & Recreation, neighborhood volunteer groups and citizen scientists to map, measure and assess trees across the greater Portland metropolitan area.



The Tree Inventory Project is also a really great website to learn more about your neighborhood trees, and if you're looking for something to do, a great way to volunteer!

The <u>Tree ID Webmap</u> works equally well on desktop computers, tablets and mobile devices. There are different layers that show Park Trees and Street Trees, as well as satellite overlays of both winter and summer conditions.

And once you get familiar with navigating the site, you'll find you can zoom in to particular areas and search for trees by species or size, or just click on a specific tree you want to learn about and a window will pop up containing a ton of information on Park Trees including: common and scientific names, type of tree, height, diameter, crown spread (N-S and E-W directions), condition, and species facts. If that's not enough, there is also a Tree Value and Annual Benefits Index which estimates each tree's Structural Value, Carbon Storage and Carbon Sequestration.



The Street Trees layer shows *every* tree growing in *every* parking strip in *every* neighborhood in Portland! While the Street Tree pop-ups don't contain as much info as those of the Park Trees, there is still enough to ID their common and scientific names.

Be sure to bookmark the <u>Urban Forestry's Park Tree Inventory Webmap</u> in your web browser and your mobile device. And have fun ID'ing those trees!

UPCOMING ALL-DAY DEMO & CLASSES — GLENN LUCAS








