VP'S "TURN ON THINGS" • KEVIN WHITE

Winter seems to have arrived here in Oregon. It's a perfect time to turn. While remote Zoom demonstrations and meeting are still necessary, there is a light at the end of the tunnel. I, for one, am looking forward to having in-person demonstrations in 2021. That being said, we have had the opportunity to see a few demonstrators that would not have been available were it not for doing only remote demo's since April of this year.

If you missed Kathleen Duncan's demonstration in November, you can still watch it by going to the NWWT website, opening the calendar for November, and clicking on the orange box in the November 5th time slot. The demo was excellent, it looks like fun, and is very informative.

We will start 2021 with Interactive Remote Demonstrations (IRD's) just like we finished 2020. These live IRD's are getting better and better. We might occasionally use them in the future for our inperson meetings at the MAC. There are a quite a few outstanding demonstrators available for IRD's from all over the United States.

Our January meeting will be a demonstration by our own **Mike Meredith** on tool sharpening. I said this in last months newsletter, sharp tools are key to good turning. Dull tools are not safe, and they make turning much harder which is not fun. Every time I see a tool sharpening demonstration, I learn new things and am reminded of how to do it correctly. It is easy to learn bad habits in sharpening in my experience.

At our February 2021 meeting, **Michael Alguire** will do an IRD. Michael is a native New Mexican, born in Albuquerque. He began his wood turning hobby in 2013, making pens and small wooden ornaments. His passion has grown, and his art has flourished to intricate wood turned hollow forms, including bowls, vases and abstract art pieces like basket illusions and more intricate pieces called "Wheels of Delicacy." Michael's 13 years as a Machinist at the Very Large Array has helped him understand the mechanical aspects of his art. With no formal training in the Fine Arts field, Michael's creativity comes from within. His inspiration comes simply from seeing a piece of wood in its raw state and imaging the possibilities. Today Michael lives in Datil, New Mexico (which is about 138 miles southwest of Albuquerque) with his wife Patricia, his two sons, two daughters and a small farm.







In June, **John Cobb** from Kentfield, California has tentatively agreed to be our demonstrator and will do in person if possible, but also has good experience doing an IRD.







COMMUNITY SERVICE - BEADS OF COURAGE

Last fall, Northwest Woodturners member, John Sutter came up with a great idea. "Let's make 30 'exceptional' boxes for the Beads of Courage organization." **Beads of Courage, Inc.** is a non-profit organization that is dedicated to improving the quality of life for children and teens coping with serious illness.

John adapted one of his favorite box designs into a Beads of Courage box. Unique to this design is an 8-sided box – not a friendly design for turners. To ensure consistency in the boxes, NWWT milled and provided all the wood so all the rest of the work could be done on the lathe. To achieve this, NWWT partnered with the Guild of Oregon Woodworkers to produce 30 kits ready to assemble and turn.

Detailed instructions were provided along with a step by step <u>video</u>. NWWT members picked up the kits and turned them into beautiful Beads of Courage boxes.

All 28 Beads of Courage boxes were hand delivered by John and his wife, Luanne to Mary Bridge Children's Hospital in Tacoma, Washington. The hospital was established in 1955, by the women of the Tacoma Orthopedic Association and provides specialized pediatric care, equipment, and facilities for surrounding communities.

They were met by Child Life Department assistant, Lou Ann League and volunteer, Susan Hayes who randomly opened one of the boxes. They were both totally delighted and thought it was beautiful. They said the children really enjoy and

treasure these boxes. The patients especially love the handmade Beads of Courage, each one representing a memory along their medical journey including procedures, hospitalizations, clinic visits, and more! The beads help patients tell their own story of courage and bravery. The beautiful wooden boxes are an additional, beautiful keepsake to hold their special beads, and the patients truly enjoy receiving one. The boxes are very special and appreciated by the children and the hospital staff. John and Luanne drove home with a really good feeling that it was a worthwhile project.

This is another example of a joint community service project by NWWT members. Many members donate their work for good causes but for large projects, we make it a club effort.

"BASICS OF BOWL TURNING" CLASS • REVIEW



NWWT Members Sharpen Their Bowl Turning Skills!

Held at Dave Wood's shop, the second of many NWWT turning classes yet to come was a big hit! Seven NWWT members attended as students to improve their bowl turning skills: Cyndy Clarke, Clete Templeton, Jennifer and Todd Carpenter, James Bennett, Kevin Fairham-Wheeler,



and Dave Burgess. Bill Karow did an excellent job as lead instructor, Roger Crooks, Mike Meredith, Dave Williams, Lynne Barrett, Alan Wood, and Dave Wood served as assistants to make sure each of the seven students got on-on-one coaching for the day.

Each student picked figured maple or walnut bowl blanks from the club's inventory, and learned to mount their blanks between centers, cut a tenon, and then turn the workpiece around and mount it in a chuck. And most importantly, everybody there got to pick their own Donut Land goodies to go with hot coffee on a cold day. Maple bars and apple fritters give one that special woodturning energy and artistic inspiration that inspires creativity!

Bill Karow skillfully demonstrated each action as the students progressed from mounting their blanks to learning about push cuts, pull cuts, shear cuts and scraping. Students gathered around Bill at the instructor's lathe for each lesson along the way. Then, back to their own lathes to practice what they had just learned with guidance from their coaches.

NWWT experts and long time members, Dave Williams and Mike Meredith took the lead in showing the proper ways to sharpen bowl gouges, scrapers, and parting tools using two grinding stations equipped with the Oneway Vari-Grind and Tormek systems. Each student got a chance to learn about their own tools, see what the other students had, and compare notes for their future purchases.

And, of course, each student learned how to sharpen his own tools properly and safely. After all, a sharp tool is the safest tool. Some tools showed up not-so-sharp, but all went home with a razor edge.







At the end of a fantastic day, we all gathered to show off our creations. Each student left with one or two bowls and a feeling of real accomplishment. The great thing about woodturning is that there is no limit to how much we can learn, how far we take our skill level upward, and how much simple enjoyment we can realize in these challenging and often frustrating times. We all had a great time learning, creating, laughing and smiling, and building stronger friendships. Good things in these troubled times.

I'm sure everyone reading this has turned a bowl, and we certainly have had lots of demonstrations on bowl turning. I think I have seen (and maybe bought) every tool available to core out a bowl. So, what is left? Check this out.

TIP OF THE MONTH • ROGER CROOKS

You get what you pay for. Surely everyone has heard that expression. This is just a short article about "bargains."

I was carving a vase (*Figure 3*) which required removing lots of wood (relief carving). With my rotary tools, I first hogged it out with an aggressive, tungsten-carbide burr. I then switched to sanding bands (*Figure 2*).

If you use a rotary tool like a Dremel, you can pay about **\$4 for six** ½" Dremel sanding bands, or you can get over **300 bands for \$10** on Amazon. **3¢/band vs. 65¢/band**. I figured I could use twenty cheap ones at the same price as one expensive one. Not a hard decision. BUT when I used the first one, it blew up in seconds hitting me (thankfully) in my glasses. Tried again – this one lasted about 30 seconds before exploding. And it went on, some

lasted longer, but I had to slow down the speed which made the job harder and longer. Little did I suspect they would just blow up (Figure 1); I only considered wear.

So now I have a wastebasket full of sanding bands and a small box of quality bands from <u>Klingspor</u> (about **40¢/band**). They are a high-end supplier of all types of sandpaper.

So, the moral of the story....Well, you can figure it out on your own.



CREATING YOUR OWN PERSONAL PHOTO ALBUM ON THE NEW WEBSITE

Member photo albums are collections of photos that can appear on a member's profile.

Members can create multiple photo albums and upload photos to their albums. Members can add descriptions to their albums and captions to their photos.

There is a limit of 50 photos for each member photo album. Photos added to member photo albums do **not** count towards your overall file storage limit.

Administrators can control how many albums a member can add to their profile. Both administrators and members can control whether other members and non-members can view their photo albums. Administrators cannot manage photos within member photo albums.

Setting up your own photo albums:

- 1. Log in to the website
- 2. Click on your name in the upper right corner



3. Click on Member photo albums



4. Click on Add Album




From there you name the album and optionally add a description. Click on **Submit** and then you can add five photos at a time.




CREATING YOUR PERSONAL PHOTO ALBUM (CONT.)

On the dialog box that appears, select up to five images to be uploaded at a time.



You can select photos saved using the following file formats: .jpg, .gif, .png and .tif.

After selecting the files to be uploaded, click the **Upload** button.



The selected photos will be uploaded and added to the photo album.

Managing photos:

After adding photos to a photo album, you can set a photo as the album cover, assign a caption to the photo, or delete photos.

Administrators cannot manage photos within member photo albums

Setting a photo as the album cover:

To set a photo as the album cover – so that the photo is used as the thumbnail for the album – hover over the photo within the album then click the **Set as cover** link.



The photo will now appear as the first photo within the album, and as the album cover on the **Member photo albums** page.

CREATING YOUR PERSONAL PHOTO ALBUM (CONT.)

Assigning a photo caption:

To assign a caption to a photo, click the photo within the photo album, then click the **Add caption** link that appears below the photo.


In the field that appears, enter the caption, then click **Save**.

Viewing member photo albums:

Member information is protected to only other NWWT members including the photo albums.

- 1. Log in to the website
- 2. Go to your profile (see above)
- 3. Click on Member photo album

On the member's profile, the photo albums will be displayed, using one photo from each album as the album cover.



To view a photo album, the visitor clicks the album cover. Thumbnails will be displayed for each photo in the album.




To view a larger version of a photo, click the thumbnail within the photo album page. On the individual photo page, the photo will be displayed as close to full size as can fit on the page.



CREATING YOUR PERSONAL PHOTO ALBUM (CONT.)

To view the full version of the photo in a separate browser tab, click the photo within the photo page. To scroll through other images in the album, click the **Previous** or **Next** links.

To upload a photo to an album, open the album (if it isn't open already) then click the **Upload photos** button.



The caption will appear below the photo thumbnail within the album and on the individual photo page.

Deleting photos:

To delete a photo, hover over its thumbnail within the photo album page, then click the **Delete** link that appears.



You can also delete a photo from the individual photo page by clicking the **Delete photo** button that appears in the upper right corner.




