AAW'S CALL FOR VIDEOGRAPHERS · ROGER CROOKS



I am the local lead for recruiting videographers for the show. My job is to collect the names of persons interested in being camera operators for the demonstrations. I will send the names to the AAW videographer committee. They will conduct a phone interview with you. The selection is done by the AAW committee. During the show, I will be available to assist and answer questions the videographers might have.

2024 Symposium

The 2024 show will be at the Oregon Convention Center as it was in 2017. There will be nine demo rooms - two Live Demo rooms that go on-air, and seven Standard Demo rooms.

Videographers Benefits

- Selected videographers receive free admission to the symposium, banquet, and a t-shirt.
- A total of 24-26 videographers are needed.

Videographer Show Requirements

- **Technical knowledge** will be part of the interview process.
- **Wednesday** Unpacking of equipment and setup of the rooms. Not everyone is required.
- Thursday Mandatory training on the boom cameras and the switcher. Everyone is required to attend.
- Friday Sunday Show
- **Sunday Afternoon** Teardown. The more we have the faster it will go.

Videography Volunteers Timeline

- **December 15 February 1** The application process opens up. The link to the application will be on the AAW website.
- **February** Applications are called for a short interview.
- Around the first of April Applicants will be notified if they are selected.

Details of the Job

There will be nine demo rooms including discussion rooms. Two of the nine rooms are live.

- There are a total of 90 demos for 10 rotations.
 - o 20 demos in the two Live rooms 12 videographers.
 - The remaining seven demo rooms with 70 demos will need 12 to 14 videographers.

Two Live Rooms - Four teams/three people per team = 12 Videographers

These rooms are broadcast live worldwide.

- **Boom Operator** Operates the boom camera.
- **Switcher operator** Controls what goes to air
- **Audience monitor (Chat) –** Monitors audience feedback and answers questions or passes the question to the demonstrator.

Seven Demo Rooms - One videographer per demo = 12-14 Videographers for 70 demos

Each room just has a boom camera and two large monitors. There will be a room helper who is not a videographer.

• **Boom Operator** – Operates the boom camera.

Requirements

- **Boom Operator** Looking for experienced camera operators. The boom will require training and practice which will occur on the Thursday before the show.
- **Switcher Operator (Live Rooms Only) –** Minimal technical knowledge is required, but knowledge of turning is required. Switcher orientation will occur on the Thursday before the show.
- Audience Monitor (Live Rooms Only) Knowledge of turning required. They will monitor the online chat and answer questions or pass them on to the demonstrator—minimal technical knowledge is required.

November Open Shop - a Tale of Two Demos

The NWWT Board has had discussions over the last couple of years about ways to make Open Shops more beneficial and more educational for our members. The Open Shop name itself suggests "open-ness" to all and flexibility in the agenda. The obvious challenge is to achieve some structure in our agenda, while at the same time keeping things flexible for folks who just want to come and practice woodturning.

Some of our members regularly use Open Shop for lathe-time to do turning projects while there is expert help available. Others come to buy supplies from the store, show off recent work, or get some tips on how to avoid those pesky catches. And we all enjoy the time to chat over a cup of coffee and a donut about the big bowl that got away!

So, with all of that in mind, we are evolving, as always. This month we decided to have two 30-minute demos on two very different topics. Rob Vogtman showed us how he uses a router mounted on the lathe's tool rest to carve features and inlays on a bowl or spindle exterior surface. He's made his own fixtures, very skillfully I might add, that allow the use of a commonly available trim router. The work he does with his lathe-mounted router is quite stunning and very creative. Thanks, Rob!







Another topic that has come up numerous times from our newer members in the last couple of years is how to make tool handles, and specifically how to make and install the ferrule on the handle. So, we asked Tom Willing to make a handle and install a ferrule – in 30 minutes – which is tough for Tom. (It's a little like asking Einstein to briefly explain physics.) But he did it, and we all learned a bit more than we previously knew. Thanks, Tom!





We're going to use this approach with Open Shops for a while to see how it works. So, if you have 30-minute topics of interest that you would like to see demonstrated at a future Open Shop, feed your ideas to Dave Wood, and we'll try to incorporate them while still preserving plenty of time for those of you who come to make shavings fly.

In the meantime, there is no Open Shop in December because of the Stuart Batty Experience from December 7th thru 10th. The next Open Shop is January 13th, and we hope to see you then!

Final 201 Project Classes of 2023 Produce Platters and Grinders

We kicked off the weekend with the "201 Spindles Project Course" on Saturday morning. The project for this session was a **Pepper Grinder**, or as some call it, a **Pepper Mill**. Tom Willing led the class which was attended by Dave Fisk, Ruth Warbington, Mary Carey, Mark McNamara, and Adam Cox. Jim Schoeffel, Roger Crooks, and Dave Wood assisted Tom as coaches for the group.









Pepper grinders are fun to make and ultimately useful, but they are not as easy to make as one might think before actually doing so. We learned that in class for sure, but everyone waded through the process with success.

The final touches and the sanding and finishing were done afterward at home in most cases. A couple of the completed grinders were shown off at the November 11 Open Shop, and they were very attractively done indeed.

Led by Steve Newberry and coaches Roger Crooks, Mike Meredith, and Dave Wood, the class members included Roger Klick, Jay Johnston, Gerry Monkman, Glenn Nord, and Adam Cox.

One distinguishing feature of most plates and platters is the ogee curve on the underside. Besides the styling aspect of the ogee curve's pleasing look, it also serves the purpose of raising the lip of the plate from the table surface to make room for one's fingers to grip it. And once again, cutting an ogee curve is not as easy as it might look.



We also learned that the transition area between the rim and center section where the food sits called the well, is also an important design and function feature. Usually, a bead or groove is cut to mark the separation of zones.

Again, easier to talk about than to do. But then, that's the purpose of these project classes – to take us all to the next level of expertise, mastering one design feature skill at a time.

Note: Steve Newberry was so busy teaching the class that he never got to finish his platter (above), so I finished it for him a couple of days later. Steve – if you'd like to come pick it up, It's only \$125.

We all had great fun, and some beautifully shaped platters and plates were turned. There were big smiles at the end of it all, and a beautiful day outside. What more could a woodturner want?

A SAFETY REMINDER . BILL KAROW

Recently, I was using a set of small, long jaws on my Nova chuck that I hardly ever use. I've learned (sometimes the hard way) that when I am trying a new technique, or attempting something for the first time or even doing something that I just haven't done in a while, I need to pause, take a step back and reassess exactly what I am about to do.

I turn mainly bowls. I've turned quite a few, so for the most part, I know what to expect in the process. But turning a finial was something very new to me. The little piece of wood that I was using was too small to fit in my regular 50 mm jaws, so I put on the smaller, longer jaws pictured below. I chucked it up, turned the speed up quite a bit, then paused for a moment. I realized that when the piece is spinning, it looks like there is a lot more available wood to cut near the base.





Obviously, I know that there are metal jaws spinning the whole way around, and I have to be careful not to let my gouge or hand(!) come in contact with it. But I am unfamiliar with these jaws, and if I forget, even for a split-second, that the wood near the base isn't as accessible as it looks, I could really make a mess.

I recalled that helpful tip of putting painter's tape around jaws, so I did and that helped me to always know exactly where those jaws start and where my cuts need to stop.





While the tape trick is a good one, there's another thought I really want to share:

When something is unfamiliar or new to you, or you haven't done it in a while, stop for a moment. Think about what it is you are about to do: Is the wood secured as best it could be? Is the speed right for what you're attempting? The right tool? Sharp enough? Tool rest height? Everything tightened down? And are there any other small adjustments that you could do to make your experience safer?

Be safe, stay sharp.




The Library will be open at the club meeting. NWWT has an extensive collection of books and DVD's, covering all facets of woodturning.


