Because of this, John and I have been working on a video to support the article. I will post it when available. The advantage of this is that the video will have much more detail and better camera work.

#### **October General Meeting – Roger Crooks, Colored Platters**

Yours truly will demonstrate three things – wood selection for a platter, design aspects for a platter, and using dyes to decorate the rim. I'll talk about different chucking methods for the front and back. But the main focus of the demo is the application of the dyes and finishing the top of the platter (bottom also, if time permits).

## VP'S "TURN ON THINGS" · JOHN BEECHWOOD

You never know where woodturning is going to take you. Sometimes an opportunity comes up that you just can't pass up.

A few months back, I was asked to make a gift from the city of Forest Grove, OR to the city of Nyuzen, Japan. Forest Grove and Nyuzen have been "Sister Cities" for 34 years. I was honored to be asked and readily accepted the project. Here's a picture of what I came up with as well as the write-up that will go with it. As I am writing this, I am in Japan and will hand-deliver the vase on Sunday.



Title: Blended Cities Vase, 2023 Artist: John Beechwood III, Forest Grove, OR, US

This vase represents the strong bond between our two cities. The material chosen is myrtle wood which only grows in the US Pacific Northwest region. This piece was harvested within a few hours of Nyuzen's sister city, Forest Grove, Oregon. The shape is a blend of traditional Japanese upper with a base more often seen on traditional American vases. The finish is a tung oil which is widely used in both the US and Japan. It was specifically created by local Forest Grove artist John Beechwood III in celebration of Nyuzen's 70th anniversary.

The variation in grain and color on the wood is called "spalting." The spalted area may be seen by some as an imperfection. The artist chose this piece to embrace the Japanese concept of wabi-sabi. It motivates us to constantly search for the beauty in imperfection and accept the more natural cycle of life. It is easy to see how it enhances the beauty of this truly original piece.



The tulips were chosen in honor of the beautiful tulips in Nyuzen and the matching ones planted in Forest Grove. Although yellow tulips can mean 'unrequited love,' they also mean 'brightness' and 'sunshine.' We chose yellow to convey our sincere wish for a bright future for Nyuzen-machi and our sister city relationship.

## FALL 2023 TRAINING CLASSES





We kicked off the fall training sequence with NWWT's Sharpening Lathe Tools class held on September 23, with a full roster of 7 students, including Mary Carey, Mike Muhm, Cindy Kollofski, Tomas Jancovsky, Debbie and Tim McClellan, and Shari Smith.

Resident chemist and metallurgist, Mike Meredith, took the Lead Instructor role. Each student had their own fully equipped grinding station and a coach to help with the learning process.

Dave Wood provided a glimpse into the world of free-hand sharpening by demonstrating the 40/40 grind on a bowl gouge, and his favorite free-hand spindle gouge grind. Free-hand gouge sharpening isn't for everyone, but it can be a quick way to get back to turning in a few seconds rather than a few minutes.

Additional coaches for the day included Bill

Karow, Tom Willing, Roger Levine, Skip Burke, and Steve Newberry.

Our decision to hold the Sharpening class first in the series of five courses is paying dividends by better preparing students for the basic bowl and spindle turning classes.

The day was a big success, and now we move on to the next classes in the series.

The Spindle Turning Basics class on October 7, and the Bowl Turning Basics class on October 8, are both full with seven students.

These are full-day classes, and each student will learn by doing with alternating demonstration/instruction segments and at-the-lathe segments throughout the day. Each student will make one or two turnings to take home by the end of the day.

Coming up on October 28 and 29, we will conduct the 201 intermediate skill-level classes. These are our "Project" courses which teach more advanced turning techniques based on the particular project being made. The Spindle Turning 201 class will make a pepper mill, and the Bowl Turning 201 class will turn a plate or platter.

We still have openings for both 201 classes, so lock in your spot now. These classes are not intended for beginners. See the course descriptions on the website for details.

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#### WOOD CUTTING PARTY · MARK MAC




#### Here's the October Timber Report:

#### SAFETY · KEVIN JESEQUEL

#### **It Happened In An Instant**



"It happened in an instant", words too often spoken after an accident. In this case, they were spoken by a Florida-based artist that I follow on Instagram. I'll let Scott (@ncwoodsmith) describe the accident in his own words (with permission):

"One week ago today, I nearly amputated my arm doing what I am doing here [the video accompanying this post on Instagram shows Scott using an angle grinder with a 4" carbide toothed wheel to carve out the inside of a large mahogany bowl]. I was working on this large live-edge mahogany centerpiece when, best I can tell because it happened so fast, the grinder and its extra coarse carbide wheel had some unexpected kickback. The tool spun counterclockwise from my perspective and the spikey carbide wheel found purchase on the tight nylon sleeve I was wearing.

The key point is these sleeves are designed not to tear, (a fact I learned that day) so it wound around the wheel. Now powering down, the muscle in my right forearm provided little resistance to the aggressive carving wheel, and the sleeve pulled it tight into my flesh. So, I went from doing something I've done a hundred times to seeing my grinder



flop over, still tangled in the sleeve, exposing a gaping hole in my arm that rapidly filled with blood. I tried tearing the




grinder off, but that damned fabric! I peeled it off my arm, the grinder still tangled in the sleeve. A stream of curses seemed appropriate at that time. I took off my other nylon sleeve and, after a few failed tries using my non-dominant hand and my teeth, I got a tourniquet on above my elbow. It didn't seem to stop the flow, so I went into the shop and found another sleeve for a second tourniquet, leaving a trail and puddles of blood along the way. Lots and lots of blood. The second tourniquet helped, but not much. I went back outside and sat in a chair, started making calls. First to my ex, telling her she needed to pick up our daughter from school. She said I sounded very weird. I called my kids, asking for a ride to the ER.

At this point, I was going into shock and was losing feeling in my hands and feet. My right hand was folding in on itself, and I couldn't move it. I elevated my arm on a vertical floor fan, blood pouring over it. I remembered the tourniquet, but forgot all about compression! Fading fast, I called 911, and about 5 minutes later, I heard a firefighter say, '*He's back here!*' It was a surreal ride to the ER with the medics praising my tourniquets while applying a real one higher up, at the base of my deltoid. '*Am I going to lose my arm?' Too early to say*' was the reply. So, long story short, no. I got to keep my arm. I'm floored that I'm back at it a week later. I'll admit, I had to psych myself up a bit to get there, having just removed the bloody sleeve from my grinder. It had tangled all the way into the motor housing. The good news is, I got through it with no further wouldbe mortal wounds."

Scott refers to himself as a "recovering newspaper journalist" and is a full-time wood artist, relying on the vibrant Florida art show scene to make his living. In this incident, Scott was using a grinding wheel that is generally regarded as safe, and the sleeves he was wearing to protect his forearms from flying chips were tight fitting, not loose. It is difficult to say what happened in this situation. I will offer a reminder to always follow the manufacturers' instructions and, if a tool comes with an accessory handle, use it. If it is a two-handed tool, keep both hands firmly on the tool until it comes to a complete stop. In the case of the sleeves, I will always think of this incident when I consider if the protection provided by a piece of gear is worth the potential danger it may pose if things go wrong.






Demonstration disk after second offset 9.5" dia. demo disk 16" dia. faceplate.








#### LAURENT NICLOT · CASCADE OCTOBER DEMO



Laurent Niclot is a wonderful demonstrator from France (now living in Colorado). He will be doing the Thursday evening chapter demo for Cascade on Oct 19 (free), an all-day demo at Dale's shop in Gresham on Friday starting at 9am (\$25), and the hands-on class on Saturday. Currently the hands-on class is full, but if someone is interested, I will put them on the reserve list. For Eli classes last month, I had three people cancel for family/health reasons, and the reserve list was used. The cost of the all day hands-on class is \$100.

#### Cascade Woodturners Evening Meeting Demo - 10/19

*Mini Hollow Forms:* In this demo, we will be turning and hollowing several miniature hollow forms (varying in size and shape) using my signature Niclot Mini Hollowers. I will use different tools for the outside shape focusing on getting a nice cut. We will talk about how to gauge the thickness and I will give the audience the opportunity to choose from a variety of textures to add another element to the form. LEVEL: Something for everybody.

#### All-Day Demo – 10/20: Morning – Sphere & Carving

*Spheres:* Roughing out and turning of a perfect sphere between centers and remounting for the finishing using a jam chuck made out of green wood. The sphere is a very pure shape but is also one of the most complicated. It is a great canvas for carving and texturing as well as a pleasant shape that will put forward the beauty of the wood grain.

*Carving:* Using a previously turned form, drawing of a spiraling design, carving using power tools to make the design both concave and convex. Then, using a woodburner and rotary tools, texturing of the flutes and beads created. Then coloring the form with ink and gilding wax (optional). The techniques used in the presentation can be applied on a multitude of forms. The texturing possibilities presented will open the participants minds and encourage them to try these techniques with whatever tools they have available, without having to procure specific burrs.


#### In the Afternoon: Teapot & Drop

*Teapot:* Turning of a miniature teapot (approximately an inch) using the bedan and demonstration on how to use it with the bevel up for spindle turning, hollowing of the teapot with miniature hollowing tools. Then turning of the lid and the spout (magnifiers not included) and coloring using Indian ink and gilding wax to create the Damascus steel effect. Finally, demonstration on how the make the handle using a wire and a cotton string on the lathe.

*Drop:* Turning and turning off-center of a drop using a spindle gouge and a skew. Then carving of the top of the drop using gouges and rasps to make it thinner and have two different curves on the back and the front giving it an illusion of movement. And finally, texturing of the drop using a woodburner to create a Steampunk design, a combination of gears and metal plates, and coloring using Indian ink and gilding wax.

#### All-Day Hands-On Workshop - 10/21:

We will do Miniature Hollow Forms. This can go several ways, and include coloring and texturing if interest exists.
