AAW SYMPOSIUM UPDATE · DALE LARSON

Planning for the Symposium May 23-26 at the Convention Center in Portland is ramping up. We had a committee meeting March 12. As of then, 840 members have registered to attend. This number is above what was projected and things all appear to be on track for a very nice Symposium. The next important date is April 5, when early registration ends, and the chapter discount period ends. Make sure you use your chapter discount by then and save the \$40. You can then spend an extra \$40 in the vendor show on that new lathe you certainly need!

The list of demonstrators, and what they will be demonstrating, can be found <u>HERE</u>. And the entire weekend's Symposium schedule can be found <u>HERE</u>.

If you are coming to the Symposium, consider donating some finished bowls to the Empty Bowls project. This is the annual fundraising event that AAW does at the Symposium. All bowls will sell for \$25. In 2018, we raised over \$6000 for the local Meals on Wheels program. This year the money raised will go to the Sunshine Division, a local food pantry associated with the Portland Police Bureau.

Please consider volunteering to help out somewhere during the Symposium. It simply takes a lot of volunteers to make the Symposium a success. And it is easy to volunteer. Go to the <u>AAW website</u>, click on the Symposium logo and then click on <u>Volunteer</u>. Clicking on the Sign Up button takes you to Sign Up Genius and a list of the committees. There is a description of what each committee does and when they do it. Here are some of the main areas that volunteers are needed:

Videographers: This is the one place where signing up gets you a free registration. If you have experience as a videographer and are interested contact <u>Tom Lawson</u> or our own <u>Steve Walgrave</u> Tom is the national lead on videographers, and Steve Walgrave is the local lead.

Video Moving Crew: Two rooms at the Symposium are set up to live stream the demonstrations. During the breaks between demonstrations, we need to move the "old" demonstrator out of the video room and move the next demonstrator's tools into the video room. This is a good place to volunteer because you don't miss any demonstrations and you get to deal directly with the demonstrators.

Youth Turning Room: We need lots of help during the youth classes with an adult needed on each youth lathe. Help get the next generation addicted to woodturning. Larry Curry is the local lead. You can go directly to Sign Up Genius or contact **Larry** by email.

Companion Craft Area: If your spouse will be at the Symposium, we have a couple of areas that they can help with if they like keeping busy. If your spouse is craft oriented, we have a space for spouses to meet and work on craft projects. They can help organize projects or just be a good host to out of town spouses.

Merchandise Booth: The AAW merchandise booth sells AAW t-shirts, books and the like. We could also use some help there.

From personal experience, I can tell you that volunteering at the AAW symposiums over the past 17 years has changed my life. I now have friends all over the country and around the world. Volunteering brings you into contact with some wonderful and talented turners. You will develop life long friends. And these contacts can pay off for your chapter. You find out which demonstrators are interested in coming to your chapter to do demonstrations in the future.

Open Shop "Marched On" With New Visitors and Old-Timers

It was nice enough outside to open the big doors and let in the light and fresh air – a nice change from the long winter with propane heaters inside.

We had several new visitors who came to check us out and investigate all the hubbubs about woodturning they've been hearing. One of them is my personal physician, who has to listen to me talk about woodturning every time I see him.

Most of the lathes were busy all day with newer turners practicing with coaches at their elbows. Dave Fisk worked on his spindle skills, and then went home and finished up a baby rattle with a captive ring. Not bad for his first attempt. Tammi Connelly and Danny Bartlett came to use the bandsaws, and we did a bit of chainsawing for others who needed big chunks made into smaller chunks.









Quite a few people came for wood, Anchorseal, walnut oil, and other store supplies. And two more loads of freshly cut wood were dropped off by our Wood Czar, Mark McNamara's cutting teams. We have good supplies of green Big Leaf Maple, Cherry, Walnut, and Red Oak. Sizes range from smaller to bigger with some pieces only a 24" lathe can handle. Inside we have a good supply of dry wood, mostly smaller to medium-sized bowl and spindle blanks.



BOWLS 20I CLASS REVIEW · DAVE WOOD

201 Project Classes Set the Table with Platters and Goblets

Our first 201 Project Class of the year was held on March 16. Each student was challenged with turning a plate or platter, their first in most cases. Members of the class were Ruth Warbingtron, Erin McNamara, Bill Dale, Jim Bennett, Karl Eckweilerr, Tim McJinney, and Chris Erdman

John Beechwood served as Lead Instructor, and Mike Meredith, Parley Savage, Skip Burke, Dave Stallard, John Vaeth, and Dave Wood took coaching roles.







Turning a plate or platter is similar to turning a bowl in many ways, but very different in others. One of those differences is cutting recesses rather than tenons for mounting on the chuck. Each student learned how to cut a proper recess – one on each side, in fact. The other feature of most plates and platters is the "ogee" curve on the underside of the rim, which gives a pleasing-to-the-eye shape and lifts the rim off the table to make room for fingers. They're not as easy to cut as they look, but we powered through, with finesse.

Lunch outside in the sunshine was a welcome treat for all, and wandering photographer, Judy Wood, came by to snap a few shots of the group in action. I counted the apple fritters after she left, and I'm convinced we were one short. She denied any involvement.

The group produced some very nice plates and platters in this session, and we all had great fun while learning new skills and building new friendships.













SPIINDLES 201 CLASS REVIEW







Sunday, March 17th, brought a new group to the shop to learn how to turn goblets. We chose this project to teach some higher-level spindle turning skills, such as end grain hollowing and turning a small diameter stem, similar to a finial.

Students included Eugene Litvin, Tammi Connelly, Jim Bennett, and Marsden Smith. Tom Willing led the class with coaching help from Steve Newberry, Dave Williams, Mike Meredith, and Dave Wood.

Tom's first demonstration was hollowing end grain by making a small scoop. It turned out to be the perfect way to learn the basic hollowing techniques for a goblet. Tom also showed how to use a skew to cleanly cut through the end grain to smooth a spindle blank. The little conically shaped hats are the result if done correctly. I accused Tom of showing off, but he insisted he was just "lucky". Three times in a row? That's not luck – that's skill!



BOOK REVIEW BY DALE LARSON

Myrtlewood Memoirs by Terry Woodall


This book will appeal to wood artists here in the Northwest. Terry Woodall is a world renown wood carver who lives and works in Coos Bay, Oregon. Disclosure: I own three of Terry's carvings: the whale that hangs from the ceiling of my shop, a wonderful bull elk, and a salmon carved out of a piece of drift wood. I have known Terry for close to thirty years. He is a warm and generous person.

This book has two main threads. It covers the history of the harvesting and use of myrtlewood along the southern Oregon and northern California coast, going back to the late 1800's but mostly from about 1930 on. Terry covers who all the main players were and what part they played in converting myrtlewood to useful products. He also covers the decline of the individual owner/myrtlewood shops along the coast.

Terry then covers the development of his skills as a woodcarver. He started in a mass production carving business where he learned the skills and tools needed to carve this dense wood. He also learned the business side of the myrtlewood trade. Terry has been an active promoter of myrtlewood, helping organize many events around this theme. Terry has traveled around the world, including Japan and Russia, doing exhibitions of his carvings.






