

#### How it works

# AAW'S CALL FOR VIDEOGRAPHERS · ROGER CROOKS





# 2024 Symposium in Portland — May 23-26, 2024 — Call for Videographer Volunteers

I am the local lead for recruiting videographers for the show. My job is to collect the names of persons interested in being camera operators for the demonstrations. I will send the names to the AAW videographer committee. They will conduct a phone interview with you. The selection is done by the AAW committee. During the show, I will be available to assist and answer questions the videographers might have.

The 2024 show will be at the Oregon Convention Center as it was in 2017. There will be nine Demo rooms - two Live Demo rooms that go on-air, and seven Standard Demo rooms.

## **Videographers Benefits**

- · Selected videographers receive free admission to the symposium, banquet, and a t-shirt.
- A total of 24-26 videographers are needed.

## **Videographer Show Requirements**

- **Technical knowledge** will be part of the interview process.
- Wednesday Unpacking of equipment and setup of the rooms. Not everyone is required.
- Thursday Mandatory training on the boom cameras and the switcher. Everyone is required to attend.
- Friday Sunday Show
- **Sunday Afternoon** Teardown. The more volunteers, the faster it will go.

## **Videography Volunteers Timeline**

- December 15 February 1 The application process opens up. The link to the application will be on the <u>AAW</u> website.
- **February** Applicants are called for a short interview.
- Around the first of April Applicants will be notified if they are selected.

#### Details of the Job

There will be nine demo rooms including discussion rooms. Two of the nine rooms are live.

- There are a total of 90 demos for 10 rotations.
  - ► 20 demos in the two Live rooms 12 videographers.
  - ► The remaining seven demo rooms with 70 demos will need 12 to 14 videographers.

## Two Live Demo Rooms - Four teams/three people per team = 12 Videographers

These rooms are broadcast live worldwide.

- **Boom Operator** Operates the boom camera.
- **Switcher operator** Controls what goes to air
- **Audience monitor (Chat)** Monitors audience feedback and answers questions or passes the question to the demonstrator.

## Seven Demo Rooms - One Videographer per demo = 12-14 Videographers for 70 demos

Each room just has a boom camera and two large monitors. There will be a room helper who is not a videographer.


• **Boom Operator** – Operates the boom camera.

#### **Requirements**

- **Boom Operator** Looking for experienced camera operators. The boom will require training and practice which will occur on the Thursday before the show.
- **Switcher Operator (Live Rooms Only)** Minimal technical knowledge is required, but knowledge of turning is required. Switcher orientation will occur on the Thursday before the show.
- Audience Monitor (Live Rooms Only) Knowledge of turning required. They will monitor the online chat and answer questions or pass them on to the demonstrator—minimal technical knowledge is required.



# THE STUART BATTY EXPERIENCE · DAVE WOOD

The high point of 2023 for the education program was *The Stuart Batty Experience*, which began Thursday night at our monthly meeting, followed by full-day classes Friday, Saturday, and Sunday (December 8–10). Friday's class focused on basic-level bowl-turning skills. We had eight students each day, and Friday's session included Tim Moore, Marty Lawrence, Ruth Warbington, Glenn Nord, Tammi Connelly, Ed Swakon, Jennifer Carpenter, and Gina Naujock. Assisting Stuart were coaches Roger Crooks, John Beechwood, Tom Willing, and Dave Wood.





Stuart taught his approach to turning bowls using the 40/40 gouge and turning techniques, which he pioneered at a young age as a professional production woodturner in England. Stuart's technique evolved to be very fast and efficient because a production turner's time is also his money. Speed is not so important to most of us, but efficiency always counts. Efficiency means less sanding, and less sanding is always a good thing.







Because of all the woodcutting parties in the last 10 weeks, we had plenty of wet turning blanks for the classes. Each student used five or six blanks. By the end of the three days, we had used almost 50 spindle blanks and over 90 bowl blanks. Here's a hearty "THANK YOU" to our Wood Czar, Mark McNamara, and all the woodcutters who took the time and braved the wet weather to bring in the wood for us!

# THE STUART BATTY EXPERIENCE • (CONT.)



At Friday's mid-morning coffee break, we realized we had not told anyone to bring a lunch. Some familiar with our routine had brought one, but others had not. We did have donuts, but...

So, what to do when you have a lunch emergency? Call Domino's, of course. And large pizzas magically appear in 30 minutes! After lunch, I noticed that the people who *had* brought lunch also enjoyed the pizza, so it got added to the lunch agenda for all three class days. Pizza makes people happy, and happy people learn more, faster.







We took morning and afternoon breaks each day for a chance to sit down, have a cup of coffee, and get questions asked and answered. With a teacher like Stuart, there is *so much* information to digest in a short time. While there is no substitute for being there in person and having him at your side to coach you personally, his complete library of available free videos is always out there for review, or for those questions we didn't think of at the time.

















The roster for the Saturday and Sunday two-day class included Roger Klick, Chris Dix, Dave Burgess, Rob Vogtman, Steve Newberry, Steve Collett, John Vaeth, and Don Jensen. With two days, we had time to focus on developing more advanced turning skills for both spindles and bowls. Coaches rotated a bit to include Dave Williams and Bill Karow.







Any Stuart Batty class begins with sharpening tools and a discussion of how his negative rake scrapers are not really scrapers - they are "abraders" because its edge does not cause grain tearout, which a true scraper can do. It's a very fine difference not visible to the naked eye, but Stuart said, "In hindsight, I should have named them negative rake abraders rather than negative rake scrapers".







# THE STUART BATTY EXPERIENCE · (CONT.)









Next, we dove into detailed hands-on instruction and coaching on how to free-hand sharpen the 40/40 bowl gouge. Stuart sharpened everyone's 40/40 gouges to get students started right. In addition to the 40/40 gouge and negative rake "abraders", we got an education on Stuarts's version of a bottom gouge – basically a parabolic bowl gouge with the same grind as a spindle roughing gouge, featuring a 60° to 65° bevel angle. His logic is this—the bottom of a bowl is essentially all side grain, which the spindle roughing gouge shape loves to cut, so we copy that spindle roughing gouge configuration onto a strong shafted bowl gouge, and voila – a perfect smooth-cutting bottom bowl gouge that produces no tear-out. All day long we heard, "this is how we cut a surface without tear-out". That one point is probably the most important of all we learned in the two-day class.







Having a few coaches from the club on hand was a bit of an experiment. As good at turning as we might be, none of us can teach the way Stuart does. Our goal was to help keep the pace of the classes lively, and facilitate Stuart's ability to rotate around the shop and spend maximum quality time with each student. I think we accomplished that objective based on the number of bowls turned during the three days, and the size of the shavings piles at the end of each day. We moved a massive amount of shavings out the back door, but we're prepared for that.








The NWWT Store just got a new drum of Anchorseal, so we now have a good supply for "cutting season."




